Wildlife Rescue 2021 Report

Calvert Nature Society and Calvert County Natural Resources Division partners with the Owl Moon Raptor Center to rescue and transport injured hawks, owls and other raptors when needed. Other birds, large and small, and other animals, may need transport to other wildlife rehabilitation facilities as available. Transportation may require driving to the Capital Beltway, College Park to deliver the injured bird to a waiting Owl Moon volunteer, or directly to the Owl Moon Raptor Center in Boyds, MD, or to other rehabilitation centers as determined. Volunteers may also be called upon to help capture or pick up a wounded bird on location. Volunteers are essentially "on call" from morning until evening.

Skills Needed

- Ability and willingness to drive to random locations to capture or pick up the injured bird.
- Ability and willingness to drive the beltway to transport injured bird to an Owl Moon volunteer, or to other rehabilitation centers as needed
- Ability to use a cell phone to contact others involved in the capture and transport
- Ability to use G.P.S. to get to the reported location of an injured bird
- Ability to transport a box large enough to hold a bird of prey
- Ability to walk and run through fields, woods, marshes or beaches
- Ability to safely net and capture injured birds
- Ability to accurately record data on where the bird was found, and the contact information for those who reported it
- Ability and willingness to submit the recorded data into the Calvert Volunteer Portal

Volunteer Duties and Expectations

- Volunteers may be asked to respond to calls for help in Calvert, St. Mary's, Charles, southern Prince Georges, and Anne Arundel Counties
- Some locations may expose volunteers to ticks, chiggers and other biting insects, poison ivy and thorny plants
- A capture and transport effort may take several hours
- Calls for assistance are random, and may come at any time of day
- Volunteers will be handling raptors at their own risk. Thick gloves, nets and towels are recommended equipment
- Volunteers will coordinate transport with the Owl Moon Raptor Center once the bird is contained
- Volunteers are expected to enter their effort hours into the Calvert Stewards Portal

Training and Qualifications

- Volunteers are trained on site, with guidance from OMRC and/or BCNC
- Volunteers are provided with instructions for logging hours into the Calvert Portal

Summary of 2021 Activities

- In 2021 volunteers responded 181 times to help with potentially injured or trapped animals.
- Of the 156 birds rescued, the vast majority were raptors (84), followed by vultures (24), Great Blue Herons (14) and Seagulls (10). Of the raptors, 20 were Bald Eagles, 14 were Osprey, 12 were Barred Owls, and 11 were Red-Tailed Hawks. There were 15 non-birds, including 9 box turtles, 4 squirrels, a bat and an opossum
- Calls for assistance came primarily from Owl Moon Raptor Center (104). Other animal control, veterinarian and rehab services contacted us for help 28 times. 15 pleas for help via Facebook posts were also answered
- Most efforts required a simple pick up and transport (80). 42 required the volunteer to locate and
 capture before transporting. In 18 cases, the volunteer was unable to locate the bird once on site, and
 14 efforts failed to capture the target. Vultures and geese can be particularly evasive and difficult to
 catch
- 62 birds were delivered to Owl Moon Raptor Center. 24 more were taken to Tri-State Bird Rescue & Research, usually via Owl Moon. The remainder were taken to various other licensed rehabbers.
- Some of the more exciting calls were for a Nightjar, possibly a Chuck Will's Widow, and a Yellow-Billed
 Cuckoo, two birds that can be difficult to find; a Brown Pelican that unfortunately found its way miles
 inland despite being unable to fly; and a Wood Stork, found on the side of Rt 4 at a puddle. The Wood
 Stork was relocated to Flag Ponds, where it created quite a stir among birders for a few days

Future Plans

- We will continue to transport most birds to an OMRC volunteer for further transport to OMRC or Tri-State for the foreseeable future
- We will continue to investigate other rehabilitation options for non-raptors, especially for box turtles
